Valley Park under threat of development 300 homes proposed in Castle Lane – ACTION NEEDED NOW!

A planning application has been submitted to Test Valley Borough Council for a new development of 300 houses at Great Covert, on the western margin of Valley Park. The Parish Council knows that local residents do not want another 300 houses on top of the 3,000 that we have already. The developers, who will be aware that residents are less likely to respond to a planning application at this busy time of year, have been requested by the Parish Council to exhibit their proposal to Valley Park residents; however, they have not responded.

Foil it or Spoil it

We are proud that Valley Park has been voted the best place to live in England, so please write to Test Valley Borough Council to stop our area from being over-developed.

Here are some facts about the impact of the proposal on our local area:

- Great Covert is the woodland along the northern side of Castle Lane. It is situated in a designated "local gap" between North Baddesley and Valley Park. Local gaps are areas where building should be avoided, in order to maintain the separate identity and character of settlements (Policy E3 of the revised 2014 Test Valley Borough Council Local Plan).
- The woodland is an area of special archaeological interest; therefore, a full archaeological survey of the whole area is required, not just a superficial scoping report.
- The proposed site is also a SINC (site for nature conservation). Nightjars, which are offered European protection, nest in the area.
- There are significant waste water and surface water drainage issues at this location, which will place additional strain on the local water treatment works in Eastleigh.
- The single highway entrance to the development from Castle Lane crosses a Sustrans cycle route, making cycling dangerous at this point.
- A potential 600 extra cars travelling along Castle Lane will aggravate an already congested through-route between the M3, M27 and A27 and hinder the function of the Park and Ride facility at Wren's Farm.
- There are already insufficient primary school places for local children. All the schools in Valley Park, Chandlers Ford and North Baddesley are full and have waiting lists.



These are serious issues. Please make your views known.
