Tree Planting and Ash Die Back in Valley Park



The Council has put in a bid for funds from the Community Infrastructure Levy, for a tree planting scheme for 165 mature trees to be planted in various areas within Valley Park over the next three years. We are hoping to receive the funds to move our proposal forward later this year.

Sadly, the ash trees within Valley Park woodlands are almost all infected with Hymenoscyphus fraxineus. A replanting programme of whips (small trees) will be carried out during the winter months. We would like to get the local community and Friends of The Park involved in this.

Speed Sign Competition

The Parish launched a speed sign competition in Autumn term and both Knightwood and St Francis Primary Schools had a large number of entries. The Parish chose one winner from each school and the winners were announced in the school assemblies. All finalists were presented with a book voucher. Each school received £100 from the Council as a recognition for participating in the competition. The signs have now been created and will be mounted in several locations in our community once government guidance allows.

Clir Alan Dowden' s County Annual Report

I have served as the County Councillor for the Baddesley Division for 29 years. I am a member of the Health and Social Care Select Committee. If Hampshire County Council is to remain financially sustainable beyond 2021/22 there needs to be more funding allocated from National Government to Adult and Children's Social Care, which in turn will help the pressures on the NHS.

I am a member of the Hampshire Pension Fund Committee and Board. Its investment strategy has been successful and I can report that its funds are financially sound and now worth about £8 billion.

The Council Tax for the year beginning 1st April 2020 will be £1286.28p for a Band "D" property an increase of 3.99% of which 2% is specifically allocated for Adult Social Care. Over the last ten years the County Council has needed to reduce its spending by £480 million following severe cuts in financial support from central government. Another £80 million pounds of further savings are needed next year in order to return a balanced budget. This will now result in higher costs for services and many cuts or reduced services.

Everyone can observe the lack of repairs to Hampshire's highways. The damage from potholes to resident's vehicles can be significant and compensation claims are high.

I have been happy to help various organizations within my Division with £8000 funding from my community grant fund in helping them to operate and benefit the local community. I have worked with the Knightwood and St Francis Primary Schools and last Autumn planted in Katrine Crescent Crocus & Jetfire daffodil bulbs. Now Spring has arrived everyone can see the pleasure it gives to residents and visitors to Valley Park. I would like to thank both schools because over a number of years they have helped me to plant 30,000 bulbs at no cost to the council taxpayer because I have been fortunate in gaining all the costs from business donations.

NB: Covid-19 will have a further significant impact on the financial sustainability of the Council going forward.
